The sentencing gap: Punishments for serious, repeat offenders

Since the financial crisis began, the courts have failed to lock up an increasing number of serious, repeat offenders. 64.9% of those convicted of serious offences who already had more than 10 previous convictions or cautions avoided prison in 2011/12 - 91,032 offenders. This is higher than the total prison population. Tens of thousands of repeat offenders are instead receiving fines, community service or a fully suspended sentence for crimes such as violence against the person, theft and sexual offences.

Key Findings

- In 2011/12, 68,100 received a penalty other than prison for a serious offence despite 15 or more previous convictions or cautions.
 - This compares to 49,729 in 2006/07 a 38% increase.
 - A total of 108,119 serious offenders had 15 or more previous convictions/cautions, meaning **62.9% of them avoided prison**.
- The number of serious offenders who avoided prison despite more than 10 previous convictions/cautions rose from 71,301 in 2006/07 to 91,032 in 2011/12.
 - This is higher than the total prison population of 83,825 and represents a 27% increase.
 - A total of 140,168 serious offenders had more than 10 previous convictions/cautions, meaning **64.9% of them avoided prison**.
- The number of fully suspended sentences increased 31-fold for those with 15 or more previous convictions/cautions in the decade since 2001/02, from 270 to 8,284.
- 11,810 serious offenders were discharged in 2011/12 although they had 15 or more previous convictions/cautions - a 30% rise from 9,086 in 2006/07. This is in spite of statute laying down that courts may discharge offenders only in those cases where "it is inexpedient to inflict punishment".

- 20,879 received a community sentence for a serious offence after 15 or more previous convictions/cautions - a 47% rise from 14,236 in 2006/07.
- 16,111 received a fine for a serious offence after 15 or more previous convictions/cautions - a 44% rise from 11,226 in 2006/07.
- Of the minority who did go to prison for a serious offence in 2011/12, the average sentence was only 1 year 5 months.

Are too many people in prison?

Many politicians and lobby groups argue that prison should be reserved for serious and serial offenders. They imply that while prison is appropriate for the most serious repeat offenders, there are more people in prison than there are serious and serial offenders.

Centre for Crime Prevention research into sentencing data from the Ministry of Justice reveals that in fact there are far more serious and serial offenders than there are prison places. More than 91,000 (64.9%) of the 140,168 most serious, serial offenders thereby avoided prison in 2011/12 alone.


Serious offences

Crimes are either summary or indictable offences. The most serious crimes are classified as indictable offences. They consist of violence against the person, sexual offences, burglary, robbery, theft and handling stolen goods, fraud and forgery, criminal damage, some drug offences, some more serious motoring offences and other indictable offences. The chart below shows the breakdown.¹

Breakdown of all indictable offences in 2011/12



The number of criminals who receive a non-custodial sentence for indictable offences, despite a large number of prior convictions, provides a measure of how frequently or infrequently prison is used to protect the public from serious, serial offenders.

In 2011/12, this figure reached 91,032 for those with more than 10 previous convictions or cautions. This compares to 71,301 in 2006/07 (+27%). It is also considerably greater than the total prison population of 83,825.²

For those with 15 or more previous convictions, the number increased in five years from 49,729 to 68,100 - a 38% increase. Instead, tens of thousands of these offenders are receiving fines, a conditional discharge or community service. The full data, taken from the Ministry of Justice, are available in Tables 1 and 2.


Of the minority who did receive a prison sentence for a serious offence in 2011/12, the average sentence was just 1 year 5 months - up from 1 year 3 months in $2006/07.^3$

Serious offenders avoiding prison despite



How are the majority of serious, repeat offenders punished?⁴

Discharge

Statute lays down that judges may discharge offenders only in those cases where "it is inexpedient to inflict punishment".⁵ Astonishingly, it was deemed to be inexpedient to punish more than 15,000 serious offenders with more than 10 previous convictions or cautions in 2011/12 alone – a rise of 21% on five years earlier.

For those with 15 or more previous convictions or cautions, the rise was 30%.

Fine

One of the most striking increases was in the use of fines to punish the most serious repeat offenders. Those fined with 15+ prior convictions or cautions rose 44%. For those with more than 10 the increase was 37%.

Community sentence

The use of community service saw the most dramatic increase -47% for those with at least 15 prior convictions or cautions and 34% for those with more than 10.

Fully suspended sentence

Just shy of 11,000 serious, repeat offenders had their sentences fully suspended in 2011/12. This is a particularly startling figure given only 419 such offenders received a suspended sentence a decade earlier. This 26-fold increase may be explained by the Criminal Justice Act (2003). This Act repealed the requirement that courts suspend a prison sentence only when this could be "justified by the exceptional circumstances of the case".⁶

Caution, reprimand or warning

A caution, reprimand or warning was judged sufficient punishment for thousands of serious, repeat offenders. In 2011/12, 4,493 criminals received a caution, reprimand or warning for an indictable offence despite more than 15 previous convictions, reprimands or warnings.⁷

7,243 received a caution, reprimand or warning for an indictable offence despite more than 10 previous convictions, reprimands or warnings.⁸
